Reflection

The Church dedicates this 27th Sunday as Life and Dignity Sunday. However, the readings of this Sunday seem to be focused on marriage rather than dignity and life. The book of Genesis, in the first reading, talked about the union of a man and a woman as one flesh. In the gospel, Jesus reiterated this union is meant to be permanent. However, Mark, putting the encounter between Jesus and the children episode at the end of this Sunday's gospel, seemed to be yet another distraction from this Sunday's theme. Actually, it gives us a good start to talk about life and dignity.

Children and widows at Jesus' time ranked the lowest in the society. They were just a level higher than the so-called sinners. Jesus wants to remind us through the children that even the lower caste in the society has its worth. In fact, their worth is as much as the qualifications of entering the kingdom of heaven. The worth Jesus gave to the children is what we called dignity. We all have dignity because we were created in the image of God. In each human being, there is the reflection of God's love and liveliness. Whether it is the unborn child or an autistic child, they have human dignity. The most common response people offer is that dignity is about respect. To the contrary, dignity is not the same as respect. Dignity is our inherent value and worth as human beings and as creatures of God, everyone is born with it. Respect, on the other hand, is earned through one's actions. In the gospel, Jesus makes it clear that the societal way of valuing a human being is counterproductive to the will of God. If we follow the way society dictates human dignity, we will not survive as human beings for the long run.

According to John Shea, the renowned spiritual writer, "Every living thing wants to persist and expand in being. In plants and animals this drive stays on the biological level. But in humans, it becomes more complex and wide ranging. Besides wanting to biologically survive, we want to be important and esteemed." In other words, we want to have a sense of worth and respect. Unfortunately, the hierarchical structure of society becomes the norm of how we look at our worth and the worth of others. John Shea continues to say that, "If we are aligned with the powerful, wealthy and famous, or if we are respected and admired, the inner drive is satisfied. But if we are poor and unknown, the inner drive is frustrated. If upward comparison frustrates the drive to be worth something, downward comparison gives it a boost." These kind of ideas will create a "dog eat dog" society. Only the rich and the elites have a say about other less fortunate human beings.

In a marriage, or in any other relationship, if we look at each other's dignity, the basic worth God has given us, we might find it easier to resolve conflict. "Before diving into any conflict," a psychologist said, "I would sit with both sides and teach them lessons in dignity. When people truly understood what they were discussing, it shattered limitations on healing their emotional wounds. After people learn about dignity, a remarkable thing happens, everyone recognizes we all have a deep, human desire to be treated as someone of value. I believe it is our highest common denominator. This shared desire for dignity transcends all of our differences, putting our common human identity above all else." Perhaps, if a married couple recognize each other's dignity, it would reduce the frequency of conflict, and hopefully, the divorce rate would be diminished.

Dear Parents,

I would like to address the current situation within the Catholic Church in regards to the reports of abuse. For starters, our Diocese settled it's abuse cases 15 years ago and now Pennsylvania's settling their cases and next month it'll be another Diocese and this will go on for years until all cases have been settled. What do we know about all these cases? First, the overwhelming bulk of these cases date back from the 1960's to 1990's. Back then the Church and modern psychology believed that these abusers could be healed. But unfortunately today we realize that such long term healing is almost impossible. Since this revelation in the early 2000's the Church has put into place safe guards to keep our children and youth safe from predators. These safeguards include, but is not limited to requiring all Bishops, priests, deacons, employees, volunteers, and anyone who works with children and youth:

- ♦ Be fingerprinted according to Diocesan and Department of Justice procedures;
- ♦ Be background checked by the Department of Justice;
- ♦ Undergo Safe Environment training and certification; with continuing education every three years;
- ♦ Are mandated by law as mandatory reporters.

Additionally seminarians, (priests and deacons) undergo a comprehensive psychological evaluation before entering the seminary and undergo yearly human formation training and education throughout their ordained lives. Should an accusation of sexual abuse be reported, the complaint is sent to and investigated by law enforcement and the Diocese immediately. Victims of sexual abuse by church staff are urged to report the abuse by calling the toll free number (800) 364-3064. The Diocese of Orange has a zero tolerance policy as it applies to sexual abuse cases regardless of the position of the offender. Implementing these safeguards has dramatically reduced the number of reported abuse cases.


Since abuse cases have come to light we've all gone through many of the same emotions; from shock, disgust and anger to grief and disappointment. So much hurt and pain because of the horrible actions of some priest's. And so on behalf of the priesthood of Jesus Christ, I say to you that I am truly sorry and will continue to pray for the healing of all persons effected.

The complete story about the abuse cases in Pennsylvania has not been reported in the media. For this reason we must be vigilant in our pursuit of truth, to get the full story. The Catholic League and Spirit Daily both have compelling reports and blogs which add a reassuring element to where the Church is today as compared to the 1960's through the 90's. As I've said, I'm a believer....not because of Judas but because of Jesus. What some priests and bishops did was terribly evil, for me to leave the Church Jesus started because of them would be like saying that evil wins. All my life I've been fighting for good and so now today, how could I allow myself to leave Jesus in the Eucharist because of the horribly evil actions of a few? Yes, those who have broken laws, broken trust and broken innocent lives need to be held responsible for their crimes so that all victims may have their day of justice and hopefully this will never happen again. As Christians we believe that good will always triumph over evil. Our calling is to be part of the solution, to help bring God's goodness, God's kingdom to earth.

Let there be no doubt that our obligation to protect children and young people is our highest priority. The month of October is Respect Life Month - a time in which we direct our attention to those whose lives most need our protection. As Catholics, we believe that all human lives are equally deserving of dignity and respect. Each week this month we'll focus on a different aspect of human life that needs special regard. This week we pray for our elderly and all those suffering illness. Many doctors and medical professionals today advocate for the ending of lives that seem to be filled with struggle. Sometimes, they suggest that a person's quality of life is such that there is no purpose to that person's life. Yet Scripture teaches that no matter how painful a life may seem at one moment, there is always the hope of renewal, of answered prayers and freedom from pain. In the book of Tobit, we hear of two people who pray for death, as they expect no possible solution to their struggles. But God sends healing and love into their lives, and they no longer desire death. As human beings, we can never know God's plan for a life, which is why we cannot attempt to deliver what only God can - a just and dignified death. We must trust in His plan and pray for release from pain, and advocate for the protection of vulnerable loved ones.

One way you can help is by volunteering with the Ministry to the Sick and Homebound. Spend time with someone and bring Jesus to them as a Eucharistic Minister to the Sick. If you are not a Eucharistic Minister already, you can be trained! Show your love and respect for all those who are homebound, remind them of God's love and care for them. E.G. Hall in his article **Gypsies: Kings of Con** reports that the Gypsy crime families are directly responsible for an estimated \$15 billion dollars in varying forms of thievery annually in the United States.

Emergency Resources


Power: Create a power outage plan and decide what you can do before, during and after a power outage to minimize the effect on your household.

Before the power goes out:

- Fill empty space in freezer with containers of water. Frozen water will displace air and keep food cold longer. Remember to leave space in containers for ice to expand.
- Have at least one phone with a handset cord in your home. Many cordless phones will not work in a power outage.
- If you have an automatic garage door opener, learn how to use the manual release and open your garage door manually.
- Try to keep your car's gas tank at least half full. Many gas stations will not be in operation during a power outage. Fill up your tank if a major storm is predicted.
- Make sure you have a car or lighter plug cord for your cell phone.
- If you use special healthcare equipment like oxygen generators or dialysis equipment, notify your power company.

After the power goes out:

- Unplug major appliances and electronics. When the power comes back on, there may be power spikes that can damage large appliances or delicate electronics.
- Do not open refrigerators or freezers any more than necessary. An unopened refrigerator will keep food cold for approximately 4 hours, an unopened freezer will keep food frozen for approximately 24 hours.
- Use a battery-powered radio to stay informed.


