

Be patient and stand firm

Because the coming
of the Lord is near.

James 5:8

Reflection

Patience is one attribute that most of us would say we are in need of cultivating, but perhaps it may be even more acute this time of year. We all like to believe we can "go with the flow or roll with the punches," but it is precisely because it is the "most wonderful time of the year and the happiest season of all," that we become cognizant that we simply may not be as patient as we

like to think. The crowds, the inexperienced cashier, the lack of parking, the compounded traffic on the freeways and on the local roads or the inability to "find what we are looking for at the store," not to mention, we seem to find ourselves behind schedule on just about everything, will try the most patient among us. Perhaps this is the reason God's word to us this season is: ... be patient ... see how the farmer awaits the precious yield of the soil (James 5). It seems James' impacted words are filled with just the amount of ammunition we need to hear this time of year. What may sound strange however is that James seems to imply the way to prepare for God's Time and to experience Jesus coming is to wait and do nothing! Really? Can you believe James would say that during this very time of the year? Do nothing when there is so much of something we need to do!

James compares our need to wait to a farmer who patiently allows the time for his crops to grow. We are invited to embrace that same attitude when we stand in line or wait on the freeway and do so without grumbling, because that is exactly what we do when things do not materialize when we want them to happen. John the Baptist (Matthew 11) had to wait. He was the chosen one to ... prepare the way of the Lord (Matthew 11), but where did he end up? In jail! It must have been very hard for him to understand how sitting in a cold dungeon was the fulfillment of what God intended for him. He sends his disciples to ask Jesus if he was the "promised one" (Matthew 11), and again, what does John need to do? Yes, he had to wait for an answer! Finding ourselves stuck on the freeway, in line in the parking lot or at the stores or waiting online gives us the sense that we are "not in control," but perhaps waiting patiently, being alert, and anticipating God's presence in these very pressing moments may be the very thing we need most during the holidays. To embrace waiting and watching patiently appears to be disempowering, but that is probably because waiting is not one of our favorite attributes; however, if done gracefully, it can be a window to situations, peoples, things, or moments we just might miss, pass over or simply give only a momentary glace. Waiting can be a wonderful reminder to us of exactly what lays behind all the running around we do this time of year. Waiting does not mean acting with irresponsibly or passively expecting someone else to make "something happen for us," as much as it is more about our inner disposition which reveals itself in our attitudes, perceptions, and moods. We need to remember that others are waiting as well. We are not the only ones living with expectation. Waiting gracefully empowers us to see others not as adversaries (beating them to a parking space or a place in line), but those whom we might be invited to share what we may very well have that they are waiting, desiring, and hoping to receive. Is this not our experience when we "wait" and then are pleasantly surprised by receiving what we have been hoping for from someone unexpectedly?

I think the moral of this weekend's Advent word is the invitation to realize that it is in the waiting that God renews us. Waiting forces us to rely on God and not on our own will power. Waiting is not just waiting for its own sake, as much as realizing that life unfolds in God's own Time and now our own. Christ does not come by our willing it. He does not come on a pre-made time table and certainly not on our perceptions of when it is the right time or convenient for us, but Christ comes in those moments, circumstances, situations in which we find ourselves having to wait. Waiting is very hard. It will often try our patience, but our willingness to wait teaches us that it is precisely our patient waiting for God that ultimately enables us to discover God's perception of what he wishes to bring about in our lives , how he acts and works in us and how in time became one like ourselves. So wait ... Be patient. Wait for the Lord is coming (James 5)!

Our Lady of Guadalupe Nuestra Señora de Guadalupe

According to tradition Our Lady of Guadalupe, Nuestra Señora de Guadalupe, appeared miraculously on the cloak of Saint Juan Diego, a simple indigenous peasant, on the hill of Tepeyac near Mexico City on December 12, 1531. The *Imagen de la Virgen María* is often described as the Woman of the Apocalypse from the New Testament's Revelation 12:1 ... arrayed with the sun, and the moon under her feet, with twelve stars upon her head, however within this image is also a hidden layer of messages for the indigenous people of Mexico. Her blue-green mantle was the color reserved for the divine couple Ometecuhtli and Omechihuati; her belt is interpreted as a sign of pregnancy; and a cross-shaped image symbolizing the cosmos and called the *nahualli* is inscribed beneath the image's sash. She was called the Mother of Maguey, the source of the sacred beverage pulque, the milk of the Virgin, and the rays of light surrounding her doubled as maguey spines.

During a walk from his home village to Mexico City, Saint Juan Diego saw a vision of a young girl of fifteen or sixteen, surrounded by light on the slopes of the Hill of Tepeyac. Where are you going, asks Mary speaking in the local language, Nahuatl. Saint Juan Diego stopped in his tracks. The lady asked for a church to be built at that site in her honor where the cries of the poor and the oppressed will be heard. Saint Juan Diego told his story to the Spanish Bishop, Fray Juan de Zumárraga, who hears these laden words with shock and disbelief. He searches for tangible signs to know if this is true. Bishop Fray Juan de Zumárraga tells Saint Juan Diego to return and ask the Lady for a miraculous sign to prove her claim.

Mary's request was not meant to cause a division; rather it was a word of direction to build up a place where prayers, the cries of the poor and heartbroken can be heard. The Virgin told Saint Juan Diego to gather some flowers from the top of Tepeyac Hill. It was winter and no flowers bloomed, but on the hilltop Juan Diego found flowers of every sort, and the Virgin herself arranged them in his tilma or peasant cloak. When Saint Juan Diego opened the cloak before the Bishop, flowers fell to the floor and in their place was the Virgin of Guadalupe, miraculously imprinted on the fabric. The Virgin of Guadalupe is considered the Patroness of Mexico and the Americas and the Diocese of Orange calling for the conversion of the Americas.

TODAY, Youth Ministry will celebrate Our Lady of Guadalupe with a Procession of Saint Juan Diego at the 5:00 PM Sunday Evening Eucharist. Our Lady of Guadalupe Novena is celebrated for nine evenings at 6:30 PM from December 3rd through December 11th with Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament on December 11th. The Feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe will be celebrated on Monday, December 12th beginning at 5:00 AM with Las Mañanitas followed by hospitality in Olson Hall and Monday Evening, Eucharist will be at 7:00 PM followed by a reception in the hall. RECEIVING THE CHRISTMAS TREE INTO OUR HOMES



There is something special when we finally get around to putting up our Christmas Tree. The whole house is transformed by its presence. We are mesmerized by its sparkling lights and dazzling ornaments, however, it probably never occurs to us that the tree is rooted in past generations and cultures. Since the earliest times, when the world was run by wandering tribes, trees were held to be sacred. Some tribes saw them as spiritual beings; others as signs of life and death. Their transformation during different times of the day and through the various seasons made people aware of the mysterious power and force of nature to bring life, death, and resurrection. The importance of the tree is also developed in biblical tradition: ... *out of the ground God made every tree that is pleasant to the sight and good for food ...* In Genesis (Gn 2:9) we hear of the Tree of Knowledge (of good and evil) and the Tree of Life, which symbolizes not only the source of our physical and spiritual needs when we remain obedient, but also speaks to us, through Adam and Eve, of the consequences of our unfaithfulness. These two trees are made whole in the new Tree of Life, the cross. The tree that has already symbolized the eternal cycle of life to death to resurrection is now a symbol and pledge of hope to the Christian community.

The Christmas tree as we have come to know it has a comparatively young tradition. It is a medieval legend that says on Christmas night, the tree would blossom and bear fruit. Out of traditions such as these, the beginnings of our modern understanding of the Christmas tree emerged in Germany in the sixteenth century, and began to spread to other European countries. From the early times of tree worship to biblical theologies and mythologies, to current customs that bring into the community the blessings which are embodied in the seasonal tree. So, as we gather around the Christmas tree, take a moment to reflect on its deep meaning. Allow it some time to speak its words of wonder. Read Genesis 2:8-9, and reflect on Revelation 22:1-2. Pick up a branch from the tree and make a cross to bless the tree and each member of the family. As we turn on the lights of our tree, let the brightness overcome the shadows of our hearts as we pray: God, may we be as this tree, ever green and full of hope for the coming of your kingdom. Prepare in the wilderness of our hearts, a path for your return. May we be a sign of your life, death, and resurrection, which brightens the hearts and lives of a world waiting once again for Christ's return. Amen.

VATICAN CITY (CNS) – The towering spruce tree was erected in St. Peter's Square. The 82-feet-tall Christmas tree arrived in the square on Nov. 24. So, do not hesitate to put up your tree, lights, & decorations!





SAINT NICHOLAS WONDER WORKER OF MYRA



Little is known about the life of Saint Nicholas, but for 1700 years the generosity and kindness of this good bishop from Asia Minor has been kept alive through countless stories and legends, as well as plays, hymns, processions and parades, icons, shrines and festivals. Although he is the patron saint of several countries, including Greece and Russia, as well as the patron of pawnbrokers, sailors, merchants and women who wish to marry, he is especially remembered as the patron of children, most of the world knows him today as Santa Clause.

Children delight in the traditional custom of putting their shoes outside the bedroom door on the eve of his feast, and on awakening find the shoes filled with nuts, fruits, coins and cookies presents from the saint. Keeping this custom in Advent gives parents a wonderful opportunity to talk with children about Santa Clause that he was a real person who lived many years ago and that he was a very holy man who especially loved children.

Throughout the Advent-Christmas Season we invite our parishioners to bring a small Christmas ornament, remembrance or memento ornament of someone who is ill, suffering, or who has died. 
