

## Reflection

The unfolding of historical discoveries which do not seem unusual for us today, at one time were explained as a mystery. The sun, the moon, the earth's place in the cosmos and such global tragedies such as the Black Plague or lightening, thunder, electricity, air flights, earthquakes, floods, HIV, cancer, influenza and much more were in the past viewed as a mystery, the "work of the gods" or a "punishment from God". Mystery was often given a rather bad-rap because we have become accustom to referring to unexplainable phenomenon or something we cannot grasp or find a logical reason as a mystery. Even today, we embrace this notion when unexplainable occurrences break into our lives and it certainly helps us to grasp the Gospel story today: ... the Lord appeared to Joseph, son of David ... do not be afraid to take Mary your wife into your home. For it is through the Holy Spirit that this child has been conceived in her (Matthew 1). I believe all of us realize that the experience of Mary and Joseph is truly beyond a logical explanation. What was transpiring in their lives was not in the realm of human experience. No one has ever claimed to have conceived by God's Spirit. Unfortunately, sometimes even in faith, when we cannot secure an explanation about what we believe we relegate God's movements by simply stating "it is a mystery." I suppose it does satisfy our inability to put the pieces of the puzzle together, and for all intent and purposes it fulfills our inability to grasp what the experience was for Mary and Joseph.

Joseph at first glance was no different from the rest of us ... when Mary was betrothed to Joseph, but before they lived together, Mary was found with child through the Holy Spirit. Joseph her husband, since he was a righteous man ... was unwilling to expose her to shame, so he decided to divorce her quietly (Matthew 1). His response is no surprise; however, what is significant is his compassion. I believe this is what led him to a deeper understanding of exactly what might be taking place despite the fact that he just did not understand. I believe the lesson we can glean from Joseph is a greater depth of the meaning of "mystery." Mystery is not merely something in which we reference those situations we cannot explain, understand, or figure out, but rather mystery is an invitation to enter, to surrender, to embrace what we do not and perhaps cannot understand, while we wait for God to unfold its meaning in our lives: ... Joseph, son of David, do not be afraid ... take Mary into your home (Matthew 1). Both Mary and Joseph did not fully grasp or understand everything that was happening to them. I am positive they were confused and afraid. Certainly if anything, the culture they lived in would be something that threatened whether they would continue to be accepted by the community. What does make this story very interesting and fascinating is Mary and Joseph's willingness to wait, believe, and allow God to make his will known in their lives.

Often we have a very difficult time entering into the mystery of waiting. We want to know every detail, fact, or facet of how everything is put together and exactly what makes our lives and the world turn, but what we often forget is that it is precisely in the waiting that God enters into our human experience. We are invited this time of the year to enter into the festivities of this season: The Christmas trees, the lights, decorations, gatherings, shopping, the e-cards, the parades, but we also need to make sure we do not somehow miss the "mystery" of all the unexplainable reasons why things are "so different" (including our dispositions this time of the year) and embrace the deeper meaning behind what we do during this holiday time. Our journey is not so different from Mary and Joseph. It is a mysterious time of the year, not just because of all the excitement in the air, but because like Mary and Joseph we are to bear our faith and infuse our belief into all the events that we participate in including those moments in which we are not so disposed towards and wish or just hope that some situations and people would just go away! These can be a mystery that perhaps we need to "enter into" without trying to figure it out, and like Mary and Joseph simply wait for Christmas to emerge from the unexpected. Do we really believe that Mary and Joseph in the wildest dreams never expected or imagined that they would become the parents of God? I sincerely doubt it, but it was their willingness to enter into what "did not make sense" and embrace how God was "turning their world upside down," that a Savior was born. This is the way God works. He turns everything topsy-turvy and then asks us to enter into what makes absolutely no sense to us, so he can make and bring forth something unbelievable and beyond our imagination, like Mary and Joseph. Our invitation is not to try to explain things away, but to be willing to wait and allow God to bring to fulfillment his will in our lives. This is the story of Mary and Joseph and this is the story of Christmas and it is our story as well, and it's certainly the story of how God works in our lives bringing Christ once again to our world.

It is not your fault that some people forget the significance of this day.* Santa could hardly believe his ears. God was actually talking to him and his voice was warm and loving, and he did not sound angry! God then said, *Jesus and I want to thank you for helping spread the news about Christmas. Every year you help millions of people show how much they love one another on Jesus' special day. Thank you, God, Santa whispered.* He felt better.

The next year Santa worked even harder to fill hearts with love and joy so they can get ready for Christmas morning. Santa would have to hurry if he wanted to be the first person to wish Jesus Happy Birthday. He ran up the aisle, took off his hat, and knelt before the infant Jesus. He reverently placed his wrapped package next to the manger. *Happy Birthday, Jesus!* Santa whispered and thank God for making a special place for me in his plan. He smiled at the figure of the tiny infant.

## RECEIVING THE CHRISTMAS TREE INTO OUR HOMES



**VATICAN CITY (CNS) – The towering spruce tree pictured above is the 82-feet-tall Christmas tree and Creche in St. Peter's Square. The Christmas Tree arrived in the square on Nov. 24, so, do not hesitate to put up your tree, lights, & decorations!**

There is something special when we finally get around to putting up our Christmas Tree. The whole house is transformed by its presence. We are mesmerized by its sparkling lights and dazzling ornaments, however, it probably never occurs to us that the tree is rooted in past generations and cultures. Since the earliest times, when the world was run by wandering tribes, trees were held to be sacred. Some tribes saw them as spiritual beings; others as signs of life and death. Their transformation during different times of the day and through the various seasons made people aware of the mysterious power and force of nature to bring life, death, and resurrection. The importance of the tree is also developed in biblical tradition: ... out of the ground God made every tree that is pleasant to the sight and good for food ... In Genesis (Gn 2:9) we hear of the Tree of Knowledge (of good and evil) and the Tree of Life, which symbolizes not only the source of our physical and spiritual needs when we remain obedient, but also speaks to us, through Adam and Eve, of the consequences of our unfaithfulness. These two trees are made whole in the new Tree of Life, the cross. The tree that has already symbolized the eternal cycle of life to death to resurrection is now a symbol and pledge of hope to the Christian community.

The Christmas tree as we have come to know it has a comparatively young tradition. It is a medieval legend that says on Christmas night, the tree would blossom and bear fruit. Out of traditions such as these, the beginnings of our modern understanding of the Christmas tree emerged in Germany in the sixteenth century, and began to spread to other European countries. From the early times of tree worship to biblical theologies and mythologies, to current customs that bring into the community the blessings which are embodied in the seasonal tree. So, as we gather around the Christmas tree, take a moment to reflect on its deep meaning. Allow it some time to speak its words of wonder. Read Genesis 2:8-9, and reflect on Revelation 22:1-2. Pick up a branch from the tree and make a cross to bless the tree and each member of the family. As we turn on the lights of our tree, let the brightness overcome the shadows of our hearts as we pray: God, may we be as this tree, ever green and full of hope for the coming of your kingdom. Prepare in the wilderness of our hearts, a path for your return. May we be a sign of your life, death, and resurrection, which brightens the hearts and lives of a world waiting once again for Christ's return. Amen.

# Parish Life

## Posadas

Posadas originated in colonial Mexico and is an important tradition of both Mexico and the Latin America cultures. The Augustinian friars of San Agustin de Acolman, near Mexico City are believed to have celebrated the first Posadas. In 1586, Friar Diego de Soria, the Augustinian prior, obtained a papal bull from Pope Sixtus V to celebrate what were called *misa de aguinaldo Christmas Gift Masses* between December 16 and 24.



The Posada takes place on each of the nine nights leading up to Christmas from December 16 to 24th. The word Posada means "inn" or "shelter" in Spanish, and in this tradition, Mary and Joseph's journey to Bethlehem and their search for a place to stay is re-enacted. The celebration begins with a procession in which the participants hold candles and sing Christmas carols. Sometimes there will be individuals who play the parts of Mary and Joseph who lead the way. The procession will make its way to a particular home (a different one each night), where a special song (*La Cancion Para Pedir Posada*) is sung.

There are two parts to the traditional posada song. Those outside the house sing the part of Joseph asking for shelter and the family inside responds singing the part of the innkeeper saying that there is no room. Once inside the house there is a celebration which can vary from a very big fancy party to a small get-together among friends. Often the festivities begin with a short Bible reading and prayer. Then the hosts give the guests food, usually tamales and a hot drink such as ponche or atole. Then the guests break piñatas and the children are given candy. The nine nights of posadas leading up to Christmas are said to represent the nine months that Jesus spent in Mary's womb, or alternatively, to represent nine days journey to Bethlehem.

***The Posadas Celebration at Saint Angela Merici began on December 16<sup>th</sup> and will continue through Christmas Eve.***

## SAINT NICHOLAS WONDER WORKER OF MYRA



Little is known about the life of Saint Nicholas, but for 1700 years the generosity and kindness of this good bishop from Asia Minor has been kept alive through countless stories and legends, as well as plays, hymns, processions and parades, icons, shrines and festivals. Although he is the patron saint of several countries, including Greece and Russia, as well as the patron of pawnbrokers, sailors, merchants and women who wish to marry, he is especially remembered as the patron of children, most of the world knows him today as Santa Clause.

Children delight in the traditional custom of putting their shoes outside the bedroom door on the eve of his feast, and on awakening find the shoes filled with nuts, fruits, coins and cookies presents from the saint. Keeping this custom in Advent gives parents a wonderful opportunity to talk with children about Santa Clause that he was a real person who lived many years ago and that he was a very holy man who especially loved children.

## Tree of Remembrance



Throughout the Advent-Christmas Season we invite our parishioners to bring a small Christmas ornament, remembrance or memento ornament of someone who is ill, suffering, or who has died. Our hope is to once again fill our special tree with the treasure of our hearts. We have provided on the front of the tree a special Dedication Prayer, so as you place your ornament or memento on the tree, your gesture of love is entrusted into the care and heart of God and our Faith Community. At each Eucharist on Christmas Day we will ritually entrust all the ornaments and the lives they represent to God in a special blessing and prayer. This Christmas holiday no one we hold dear in our hearts and memories will be forgotten.




